

### Jose Parica Breaks the Ice at Childress



LEXINGTON - After several high finishes in 1985, Jose Parica finally won his first major 9-ball tournament, The 5th Annual Clyde Childress Open. In races to eleven, Parica defeated Davenport (5), Bell (10), Strickland (10), Hopkins (8), Varner (8), suffered a loss to Varner 7-11, and then outpointed Varner (10) for the title and the \$5,840 first prize. A bank pool division was featured once again as Gary Spaeth won the \$2,600 jackpot.

#### ACCU-FACTS

Jose Parica won three of his matches 11-10. Gary Spaeth lost both of his matches 10-11.

Efren Reyes shot four .900's: .919, .911, .903, and .900.

Reyes, MacDonald, and Brienza shot .900's yet still lost.

The 9-ball tournament produced twenty-three .900's and eight "wire" matches.

### Parica Edges Varner in Photo Finish

It was only a matter of time before the talented Jose Parica would clinch a major 9-ball title, yet it wasn't decided until the last rack of the last session in which Parica finally defeated Nick Varner 11-10. When congratulated, he reminded those present that he won "a mini and a biggie" referring to the mini tournament that he had copped earlier in the week with an equally strong field, and of course, the major title.

Monroe and Dinah Brock added \$10,000 to the forty-eight player 9-Ball division and \$1,000 to the thirty-two player Banks division. The event was hosted by The Sheraton Inn - Lexington South and directed by Pat Fleming. Five Brunswick tables were provided by The Louisville Billiard Supply and covered with Simonis. It was the first sanctioned event for the new PBA player's association.

Both divisions required two final matches. The banks division saw Gary Spaeth forge his way through the loser's bracket winning seven sessions in a row including his last two wins over Wade Crane. The 9-ball division had Parica in the winner's bracket

### Notable matches

The Clyde Childress Open produced its share of notable matches. The number in parentheses is the player's TPA for that session.

With Tom Brown (.836) leading 10-2 and maintaining an outstanding TPA of .947, the tide turned. Gary Hutchings (.874) controlled the match for the next seven racks preventing Brown from pocketing a single ball and forcing Brown to either kick or play safety. Eventually, a missed kick by Hutchings after a Brown safety allowed Brown to close out the set 11-9.

During an unusual rack in which Larry Hubbart (.750) played six consecutive safeties forcing Terry Bell (.832) to kick six consecutive times, Bell still managed to win the rack! Final score: Bell 11, Hubbart 8.

After knotting the score at 6-6, and failing to pocket a ball on the next break, Paul Brienza (.902) never shot again. Dave Bollman (.909) ran that rack, then broke and ran out the rest of the set to win 11-6.

By the time Bob Opsahl (.833) had pocketed a total of nine balls, he was leading 4-0. He never turned

### Interview

Nick Varner: "PERSONALLY, I THINK I'D LIKE TO PLAY A GAME WHERE YOU DON'T HAVE TO COMPETE AGAINST A PLAYER, BUT JUST COMPETE AGAINST THE GAME OF POOL."

ACCU-STATS: What do you think is needed to draw more contestants to major events?

VARNER: I think a lot of it has to do with the entrance fee. I think they're on the right track now. They're starting to spread it out more. I don't think that putting 30% or 40% of the prize money first is going to get it because they can't fill it up with champions, they just can't do it.

ACCU-STATS: Do you think that there should be seeding at tournaments?

VARNER: I just don't think that you could get away with seeding right now. Personally, if I was adding \$40-50,000 to an event, I believe I would seed because I think it might help the gate. I think that maybe seeding has been overlooked as far as a chance to draw a good gate.

ACCU-STATS: There have been several different tournament formats tried in the last ten years such as double elimination, two-out-of-three sets, and round robins. What do you feel is the best format?

VARNER: Right now, probably the best thing is double elimination although it might be nice to see some single elimination. I think that if the races are long enough, single elimination would be good and it might be more interesting from the crowd standpoint because

a guy is gone if he gets beat. If Mizerak and Strickland are playing, the heats on! Personally, I think I'd like to play a game where you don't have to compete against a player but just compete against the game of pool.

ACCU-STATS: How do you prepare for a tournament?

VARNER: I try to log as much playing time as I can. There are certain drills that I work on and they are usually oriented around things that you have trouble with. For instance, rail shots where you have to cut the ball thin down the rail.

Varner: "I THINK I ENJOY ONE POCKET THE BEST."

ACCU-STATS: How do you prepare for a match?

VARNER: What I think is real important is getting used to the table when you get to the tournament, getting used to the speed and where to aim. It seems that you've got to aim different. It's not as simple as practicing at home and you're in dead stroke, and then you go to the tournament and you feel the same way. look up there and you don't know quite where that point is at. Then when you finish out, usually you know where that point is at.

ACCU-STATS: Do you go through any mental preparation?

VARNER: I just try to think positive thoughts. Mostly, I just try to think about winning. I try to keep negative things from entering my mind. The negative is so strong that it's always trying to creep in there and I try to think about winning.

ACCU-STATS: When did you start playing pool?

VARNER: Five, but that's a little unusual.

ACCU-STATS: What other interests do you have outside of pool playing?

VARNER: I like to play golf.

ACCU-STATS: What weight, millimeter, and length cue do you use?

VARNER: Right now I use a cue that's 19 ounce, 12 3/4 mm, and 57 inches.

ACCU-STATS: You wear glasses. Do you wear glasses while you're playing pool?

VARNER: No. I wear my contacts.

ACCU-STATS: Who influenced most in regards pocket to billiards in your life? VARNER: I'd say my father.

ACCU-STATS: What is your most memorable moment in pool?

VARNER: I'd say when I won the World Championship in 1980.








technique reduces the standard chart's height in half while still displaying the results of the first round.

The small numbers throughout the 9-ball chart represent the loser's score for that session. For instance, Crane defeated Cone 11-4, then defeated DiToro 11-8 and so on.

### What's Next?

Our next issue of Accu-Stats will feature the Classic Cup V held in Aurora, Illinois. Since the Classic Cup tournament immediately followed the Childress, the Classic Cup issue will be mailed only ten days after this issue. Incidentally, the Classic Cup V winner was Jose Parica (That's two in a row!) and Resorts' "Last Call for 9-Ball" winner was Jim Rempe. Although this year's tournament season got off to a late start you can still expect ten issues of Accu-Stats.

### 1985 Yearbook

For the first time in pocket billiard history, a bona fide yearbook showing the statistical results of its professional players is now available! Listed are the records of the 361 players who have participated in the twelve major 9-ball tournaments of 1985. The 9-ball yearbook, called "The Wire" is housed in a three ring D-binder and is packed with over 400 pages of information.

- TOURNAMENT RESULTS Displays results of every major 9-ball tournament listing names, money winnings, won/lost record, and columns showing how each player placed in each tournament. It's similar to page 19 of this issue. (approx. I5 pages)
- LINE HISTORY REPORTS At least one page for each player, listed alphabetically, shows the results of each session played. Each line includes date, opponent, event, score, break avg., kick avg., TPA, and opponent's TPA. (approx. 375 pages)
- 3. PERFORMANCE AVERAGES Displays fifteen statistical categories ranking the top 100 players in each category. (approx. 30 pages)
- 4. SESSIONS WON/LOST This section sorts players according to their won/lost record and "sessions decided by one game." (approx. 10 pages)
- WOMEN'S STATS Displays major tournament results in money winning order, alphabetical order, and won/lost record order. (approx. 7 pages)
- 1984 RESULTS Displayed the same as section 1, with complete results of the 388 tournament players of 1984. (approx. 15 pages)


### Bell Emerges Unscathed in Cleveland Clash
